<u>Social issues addressed</u> <i>Please explain the problem you attempt to solve</i>	<p>Nearly a quarter of 18-25-year-olds in the Métropole de Lyon live below the poverty line. There are already tools to help them, but they are not enough in this time of crisis. The youth solidarity income (RSJ) was designed as a safety net for those who do not meet the criteria of aid already existing today.</p> <p>In 91% of cases for RSJ beneficiaries, young people had no resources, and the amount of the RSJ was €400. 20% are in a very precarious situation in terms of housing (9% are homeless and 11% in homes). Only 16% live in independent housing, while the rest live with a third party precariously. Of the 717 young people who joined the RSJ, 231 left it, 44% of whom were for employment or training and 15% for the opening of new rights, including the youth guarantee.</p>

<p><u>Evaluation of practice:</u> Please explain how you evaluate the practice, and what the results were/are so far</p>	<p>It started at the beginning of 2022 for a duration of 2.5 years and will require an additional 6 months for its completion. As of February 18, 2022, and after only 9 months of implementation, 717 young people have joined the safety net that is the RSJ:</p> <p>First observation: Quantitative Analysis (in progress)</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - For youth: the allowance is the main element of young people's needs; the need for support towards employment and training <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ Young people Become more independent, progress in social and professional integration, and are less anxious/stressed. - For structures: The RSJ meets an unmet need, but access to the service is still complicated for young people far from institutions.
